New Hampshire Women Strongly Favor Expanding Social Security Benefits

On behalf of Social Security Works, Public Policy Polling surveyed 539 likely voters in New Hampshire from May 27th through 29th, 2015.

• A majority of voters in New Hampshire would support basing yearly cost of living adjustments on the CPI-E, which more accurately reflect the higher inflation rate experienced by seniors and people with disabilities, resulting in annual benefits for the average retiree that are \$1,570 higher at 75 and \$2,131 higher at 85. Fifty-four (54) percent of voters from New Hampshire strongly support adopting the CPI-E, which would increase benefits.

A majority of voters in New Hampshire would support increasing the special minimum benefit to
125% of the federal poverty line (which is currently \$11,770) and base annual adjustment on the
growth in average wages, so that nobody who has earned their Social Security and retires after a
lifetime of work lives in poverty. Fifty-seven (57) percent of voters from New Hampshire strongly
support increasing the special minimum benefit.

• A majority of voters in New Hampshire strongly support gradually eliminating the maximum taxable wage base, giving credit for these contributions, up to a maximum benefit, making millionaires and billionaires pay the same rate as the rest of us. This is also known as scrap the cap. Sixty-two (62) percent of voters from New Hampshire strongly support "scrap the cap."
